

Investment Objective: Achieving long term capital growth in real terms and steadily increasing income. Our aim is to achieve a higher rate of total return than the FTSE Actuaries All-Share Index Total Return through investing in a diversified portfolio of stocks.

Fund Managers' Comments

In October the Trust's net asset value (cum income, with debt at fair value) fell 1.7%, performing approximately in line with the FTSE All-Share benchmark which fell 1.6%. The rise in bond yields following the UK Budget increased the fair value NAV relative to the par NAV – on a par NAV basis, the Trust fell 2.1%.

October was a volatile month, as the market continued to speculate which taxes would rise in the Budget. This led to particular volatility in certain sectors (such as gambling, impacting the Trust's holding in Flutter) as well as on specific markets such AIM, where there was conjecture about the future of inheritance tax relief (it was ultimately halved, which was met with relief in some share prices).

At the stock level among the largest detractors were hydrogen fuel cell companies Ceres Power and AFC Energy. There was little company-specific news, therefore share price weakness was most likely (in our view) a result of uncertainty surrounding the AIM market (in the case of AFC) and broadly cautious market sentiment. We added to the positions on share price weakness. Also among the detractors was aerospace components supplier Senior, which lowered earnings expectations for the full year as one of its biggest customers is Boeing and they have been impacted by the strike action. At the opposite end of the spectrum, several of the US holdings such as General Motors and Bristol-Myers performed well.

During the month we added to several existing positions such as motor insurer Sabre, early-stage portfolio company IP Group and auto components supplier Dowlais. In each case we think the current valuations reflect an overly pessimistic outlook for the companies. These additions were funded by sales including a reduction in the holding in Rolls-Royce.


